About Rotary International

Rotary International is the world's largest service organization, 1.2 million members strong in over 34,000 clubs spanning 168 countries. The organization and its members perform local and international service projects, focusing on the following six areas: 1) basic education and literacy, 2) economic and community development, 3) peace conflict and resolution, 4) maternal and child health, 5) water and sanitation, and 6) disease prevention and treatment.

Rotary is a grassroots organization, with most of our service occurring at the club level. The district and international structure is designed to support club service locally and globally. **The Rotary structure consists of the following**:

- Clubs: Rotarians are members of Rotary clubs, which belong to the global association Rotary International (RI). Each club elects its own officers and enjoys considerable autonomy within the framework of Rotary's constitution and bylaws.
- **Districts**: Clubs are grouped into 529 RI districts, each led by a district governor who is an officer of RI.
- Rotary International Board: The 19-member RI Board of Directors, which includes the RI president and president-elect, meets quarterly to establish policies. Traditionally, the RI president, who is elected annually, develops a theme and emphasis for the year.

Famous Rotarians

Rotary has a rich history. Amongst our members were **U.S. Presidents** such as John F. Kennedy, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson and Dwight Eisenhower; **International Figures** such as Pope Francis, Margaret Thatcher, Sir Winston Churchill, Prince Charles, and. Luciano Pavarotti; **Founders** such as Walt Disney, Charles Walgreen of Walgreen Drug Company, JC Penney, Joyce C. Hall of Hallmark Cards, Sam Walton (founder of Wal-Mart)

and Claude Vuitton of Louis Vuitton; and Innovators & Pioneers such as Thomas Edison, Neil Armstrong, Orville Wright, Charles Lindberg, and Sir Edmund Hillary.



The History of the Rotary Club of San Francisco

The Rotary Club of San Francisco was founded Nov 12th, 1908 and is the second oldest Rotary Club in the world. Chicago was the first club, 45 months older than San Francisco. Initial expansion beyond Clubs One and Two primarily took place on the US west coast.

The establishment of the Rotary Club of San Francisco in 1908 was followed by the Oakland Rotary Club (Tri-City Club) in February 1909, the Seattle Rotary Club in June 1909, and the Los Angeles Rotary Club, also in June 1909. The growth of Rotary gained momentum and 16 Rotary Clubs were established by the first Rotary International convention held in Chicago in 1910.

- **Dictionary Project:** Yearly, we purchase and deliver over 800 dictionaries to San Francisco third graders, many of whom have never had a book of their own.
- Thanksgiving at The Arc: Members supply, cook and serve Thanksgiving dinner to nearly 400 adults with developmental and physical disabilities.
- Harbor House: We support recent graduates of The Salvation Army's
 Harbor Light Center, a local addiction treatment program for homeless
 single-parents seeking sobriety and self-sufficiency. After the participants'
 graduation and re-entry into civilian life, we assist the graduates with
 essential household items for their new homes. We also provide
 Thanksgiving meals and holiday gifts for the families.
- Swinging Skirts Golf Classic: Club Two Rotarians work concessions for one week in the spring. Proceeds support San Francisco Rotary Club Two charity gifts.
- Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA): Rotarians organize and sponsor a life-changing leadership weekend for primarily 11th graders from San Francisco, Marin and the Peninsula. The students learn about opportunities for positive community impact and how to prepare for college and beyond.
- Bike Build: Members of the Rotary Club of San Francisco, along with other community partners, assemble new bicycles for distribution to disadvantaged and underserved youth.

New in 2015 - We will organize and host the first annual **Backpack Dash**. The purpose is to collect schools supplies and backpacks for local youth while enjoying a fun run in San Francisco's Golden Gate Park.



International Service



International Service

International service is a cornerstone of Rotary. Annually, many Rotarians travel abroad to help with international development projects, building a Kenyan water well, creating an Ecuadorian microfinance program, or delivering polio vaccines in India. The following are just a few of the many programs we support:

- Water & Sanitation Projects: A member of The Rotary Club of San Francisco, and Professor of Civil Engineering designed a water system for the barren landscape that is Remba Island, on Lake Victoria, Kenya.
- Cataract Surgeries: Rotavision physicians and volunteers have now completed more than 50 missions, trained several hundred ophthalmologists in countries visited, and examined and treated more than 1,800 children and adults.
- Cleft Lip and Palate: This program provides reconstructive surgeries for children with Cleft Lip and Palate worldwide. Members of the San Francisco Rotary started both Rotaplast and Alliance for Smiles.
- **Scholarships:** Rotary International is the world's largest privately funded scholarship organization.
