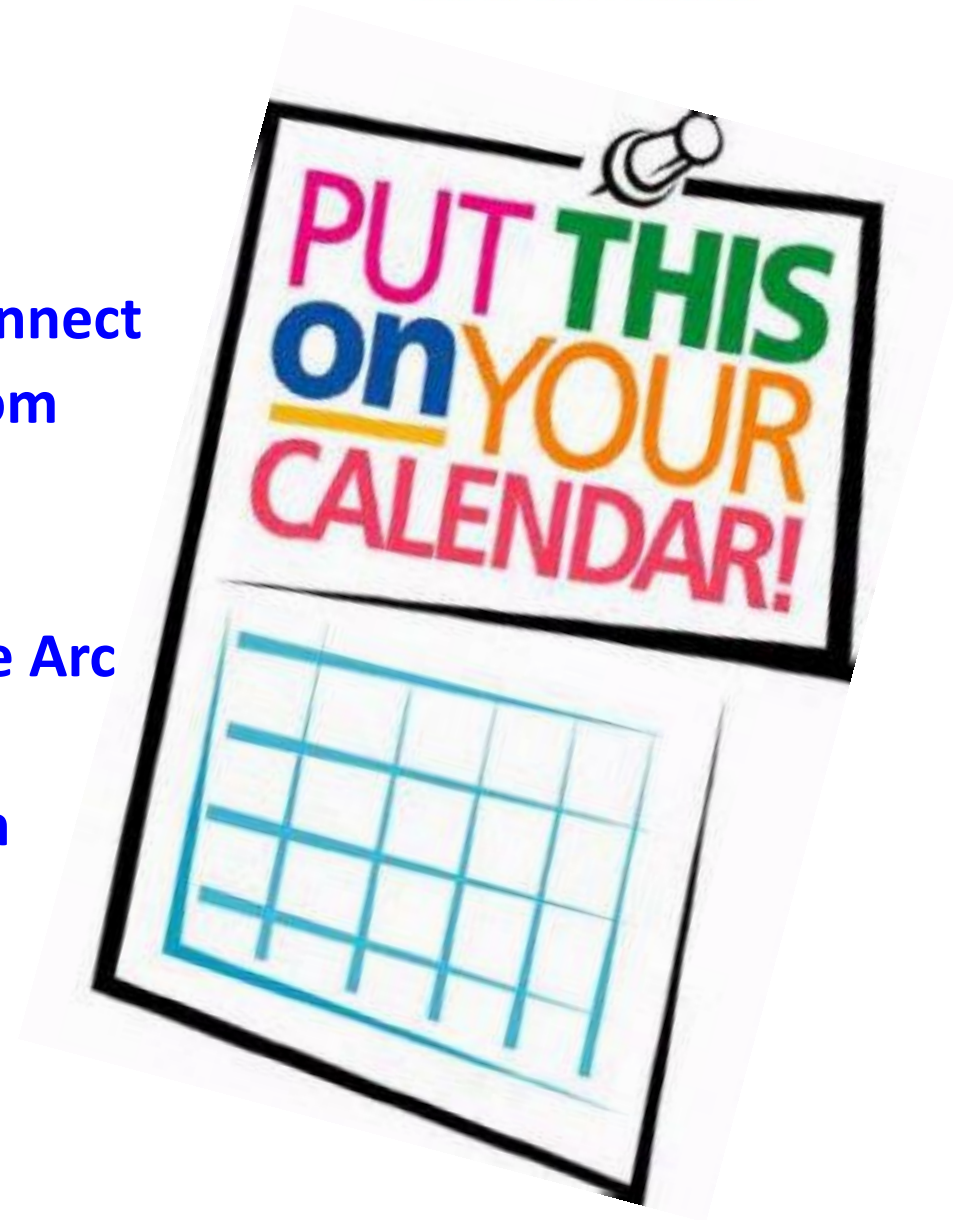

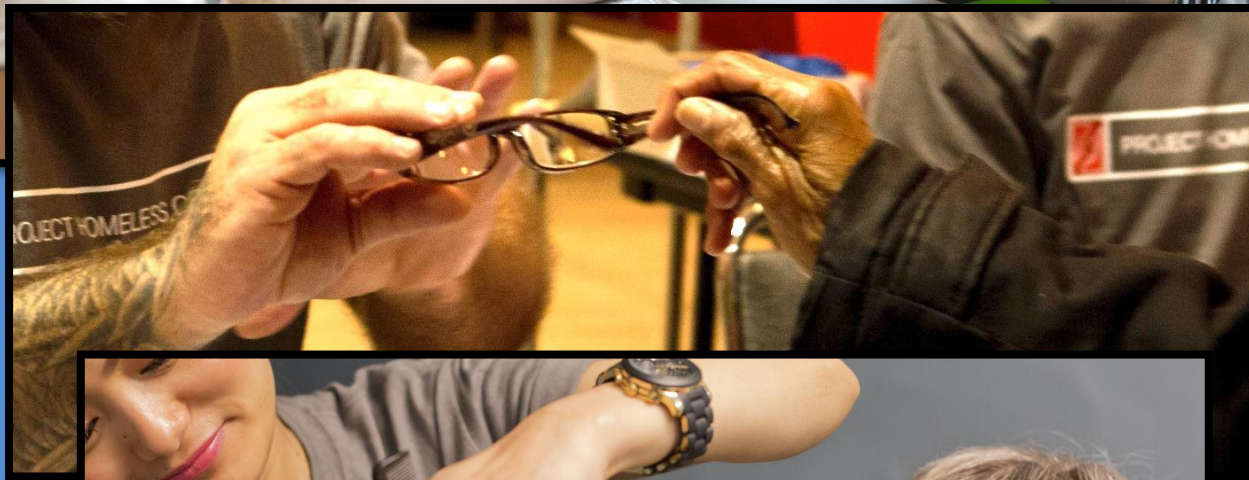

Once vacant and boarded up, an older house and barns along Great Spring Road are a new center for local Scout activities.

The Smithfield Rotary Club has leased the former home of Pete Jones from Isle of Wight County for \$1 for 20 years — and in turn, is allowing Boy Scout Troop 3, and other scouts, to use it for special events, storage, classrooms, training and other activities.

"We had to negotiate that," joked Rotary member Roderick Hallum of the \$1.

The five-acre property is located behind the Isle of Wight County Volunteer Rescue Squad and was part of the land purchase the county made for the new facility several years ago.

Troop 3 Scout Leader John Ormond said the property is being made available to Troop 3, as well as Troop 7, Sea Scouts and Venture Scouts and others, if interested.

The Smithfield Rotary Club also teamed up with the Rotary Club of North Suffolk to put together a \$10,000 Rotary Foundation district grant that will go to fixing up the house and property.

Troop 3 has also generated money over the years by selling mulch, said Rotary member and neighbor Peyton Barlow, who also

assisted in negotiating the deal with Isle of Wight County.

"The county has gone overboard in working with us, the Rotary and the Scouts to make this happen," said Barlow.

Barlow provided the right-of-way to allow access to the property.

Others that helped make the effort a success were attorney William K. Barlow, who donated

legal services, Smithfield and Newport district supervisors Dick Grice and William McCarty, Isle of Wight County administrators Randy Keaton and Don Robertson and Gordon Holloway with Farmers Service.

The Rotary Club also purchased two storage buildings that will be moved to the property, Barlow said.

The Smithfield Rotary Club

has supported the Boy Scouts since the 1930s.

Boy Scouts Charles Smith, Nathan McDonough and Seth Hemp-ley enjoyed their new quarters Thursday prior to an inaugural awards ceremony on the property.

The Scouts had spent a good deal of time cleaning out the house.

"It's a bigger place to do Scouting activities, more spacious," said Smith.

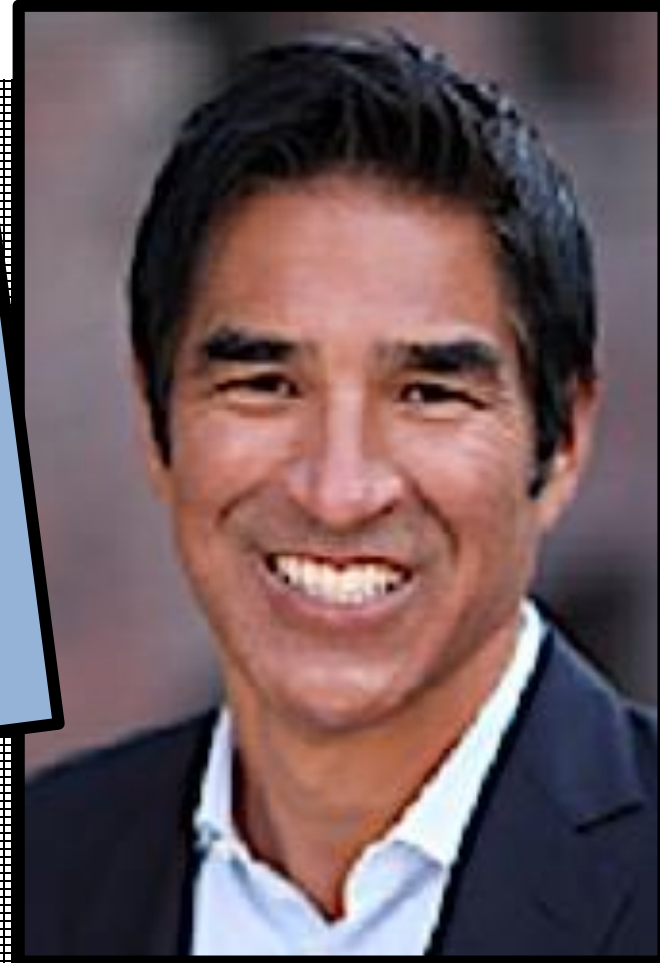


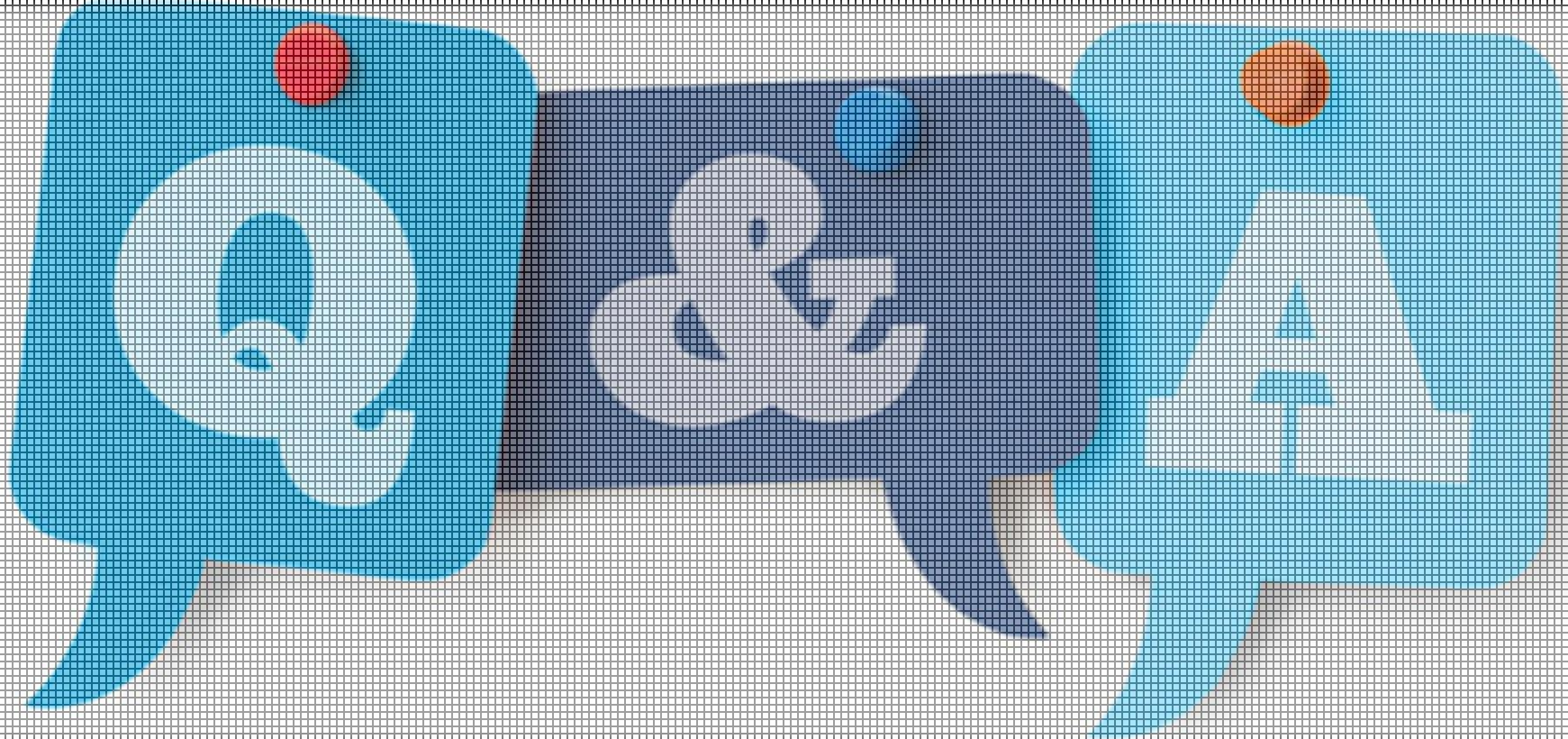

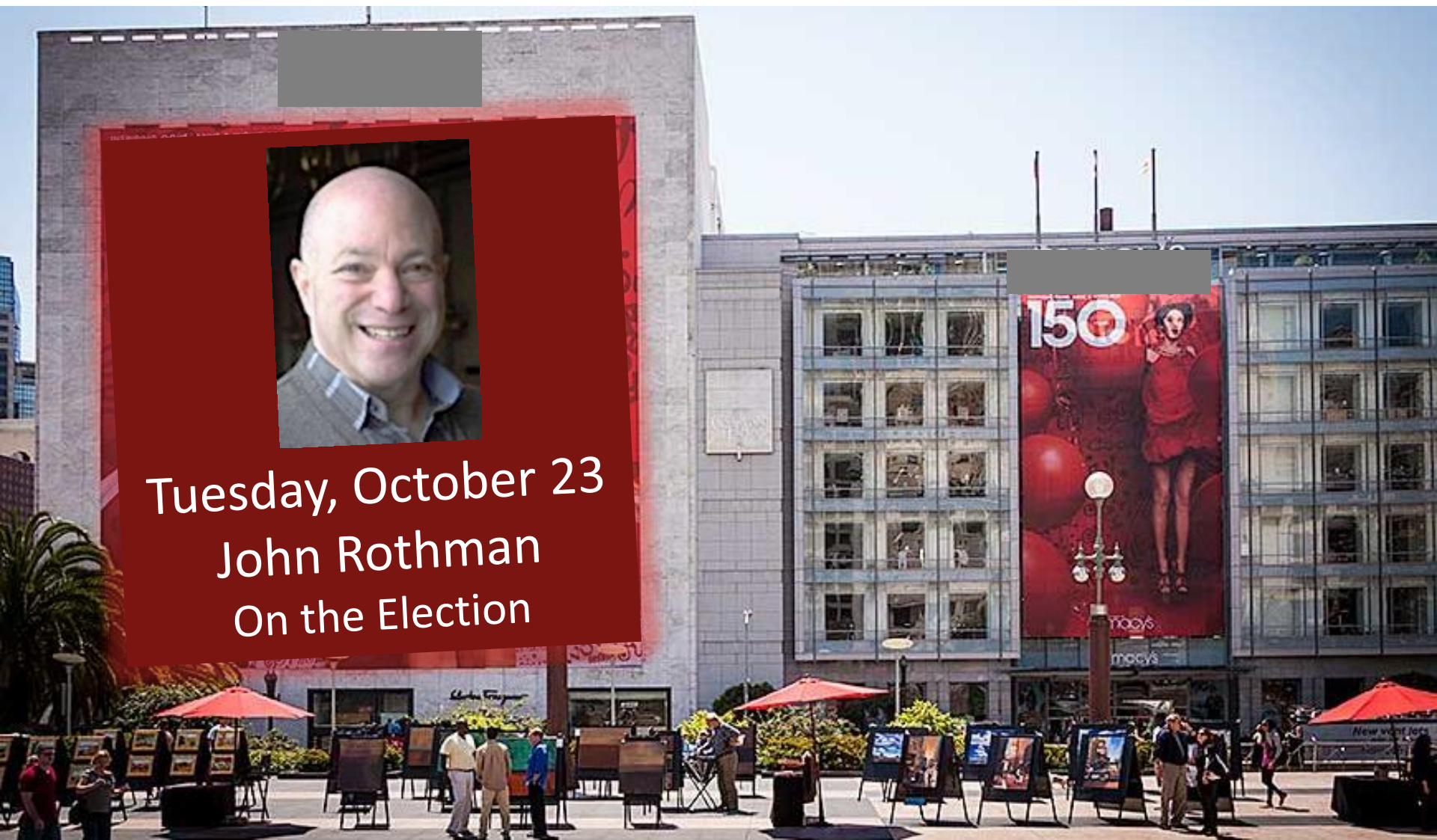
