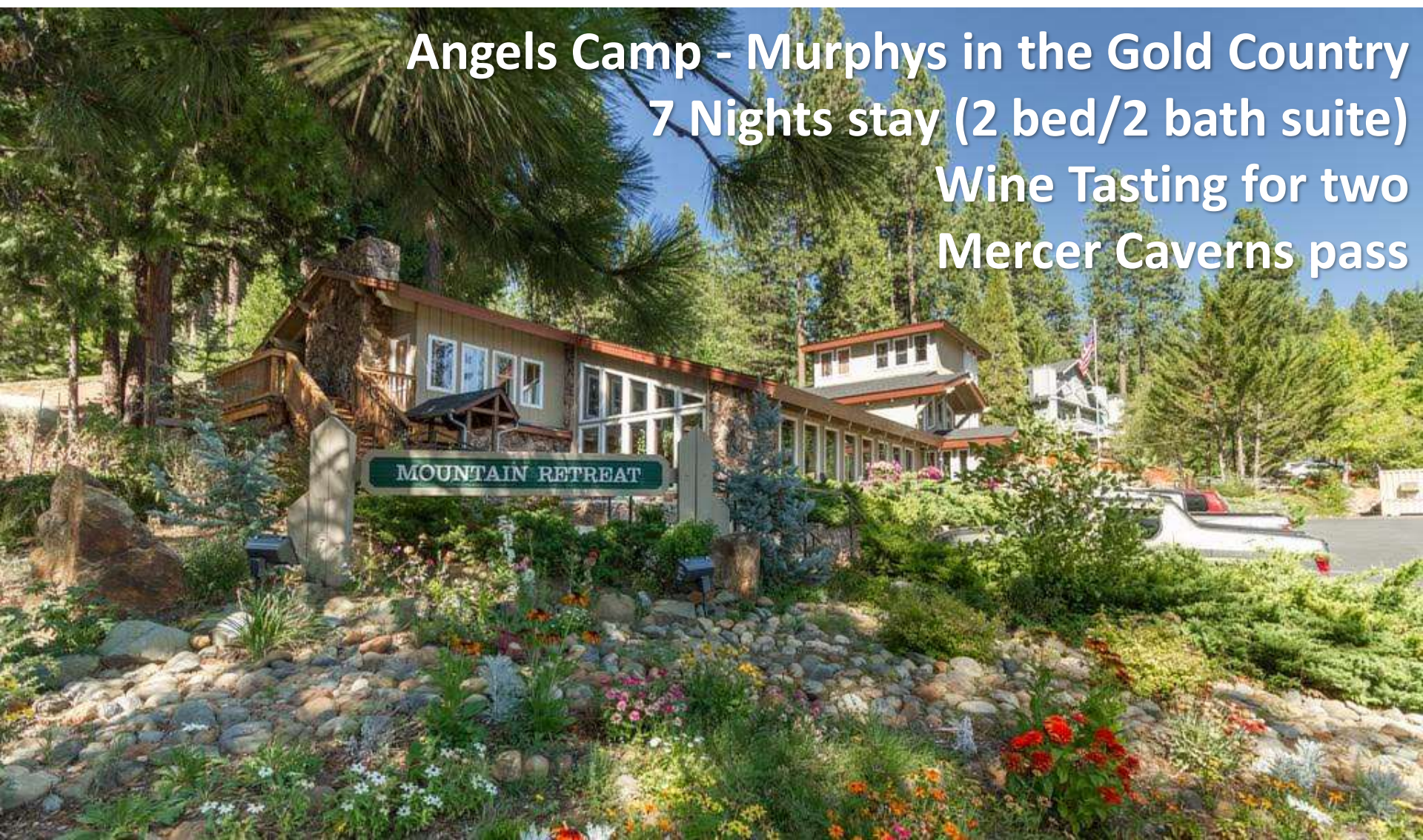

Dr. Daniel Ellsberg, 3.19.19



- **Scholar, Anti-War Activist, Government Official, Journalist**
- **Served in the Marine Corps for three years**
- **Leaked the Pentagon Papers to the New York Times in 1971 and significantly strengthened public opposition to the Vietnam War**
- **Was named by the Nixon Administration as “the most dangerous man in America” and was celebrated in Steven Spielberg's recent film, *The Post*.**
- **Attended Munich Security Conference in February 2019**
- **Speaking on importance of building trust and dialogue in an era of international tensions**

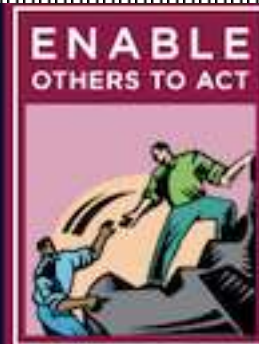
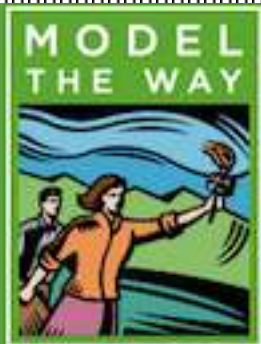

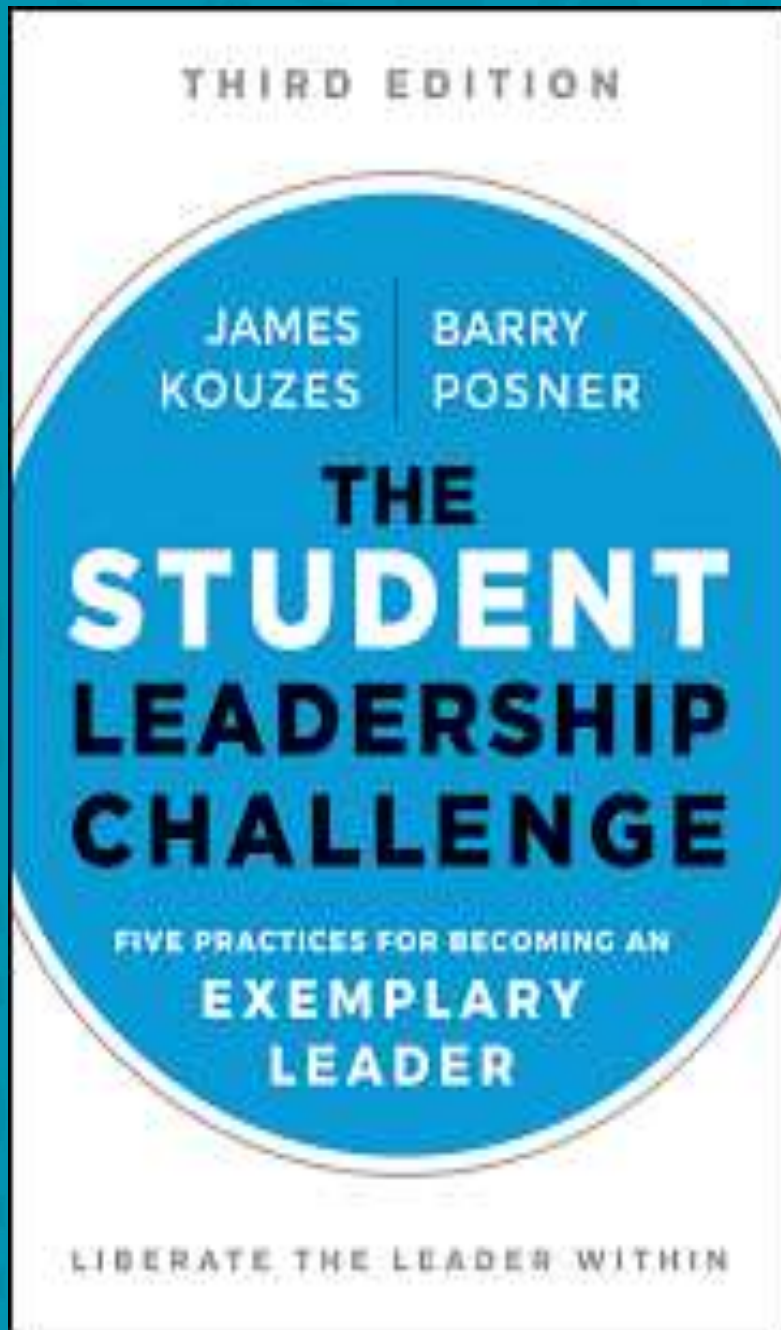

The Advocacy Hourglass is the foundation of our curricular approach and depicts the process that our students learn and practice. Students begin by thinking about broad issues in their community, narrow their topics to one local issue, and then specify a root cause that contributes to the problem. They then identify a main goal for their project, think more broadly to identify the targets of their campaign, and then choose tactics that they will utilize to get there.

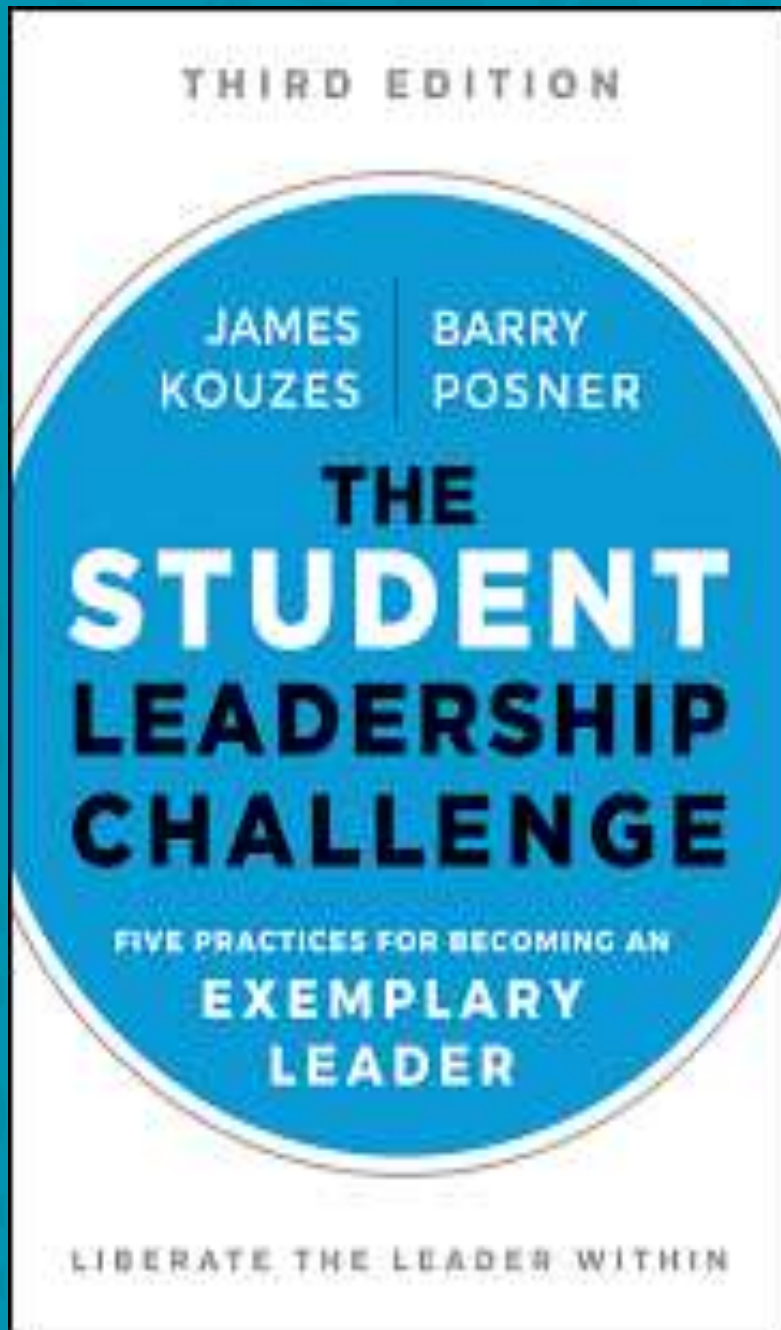

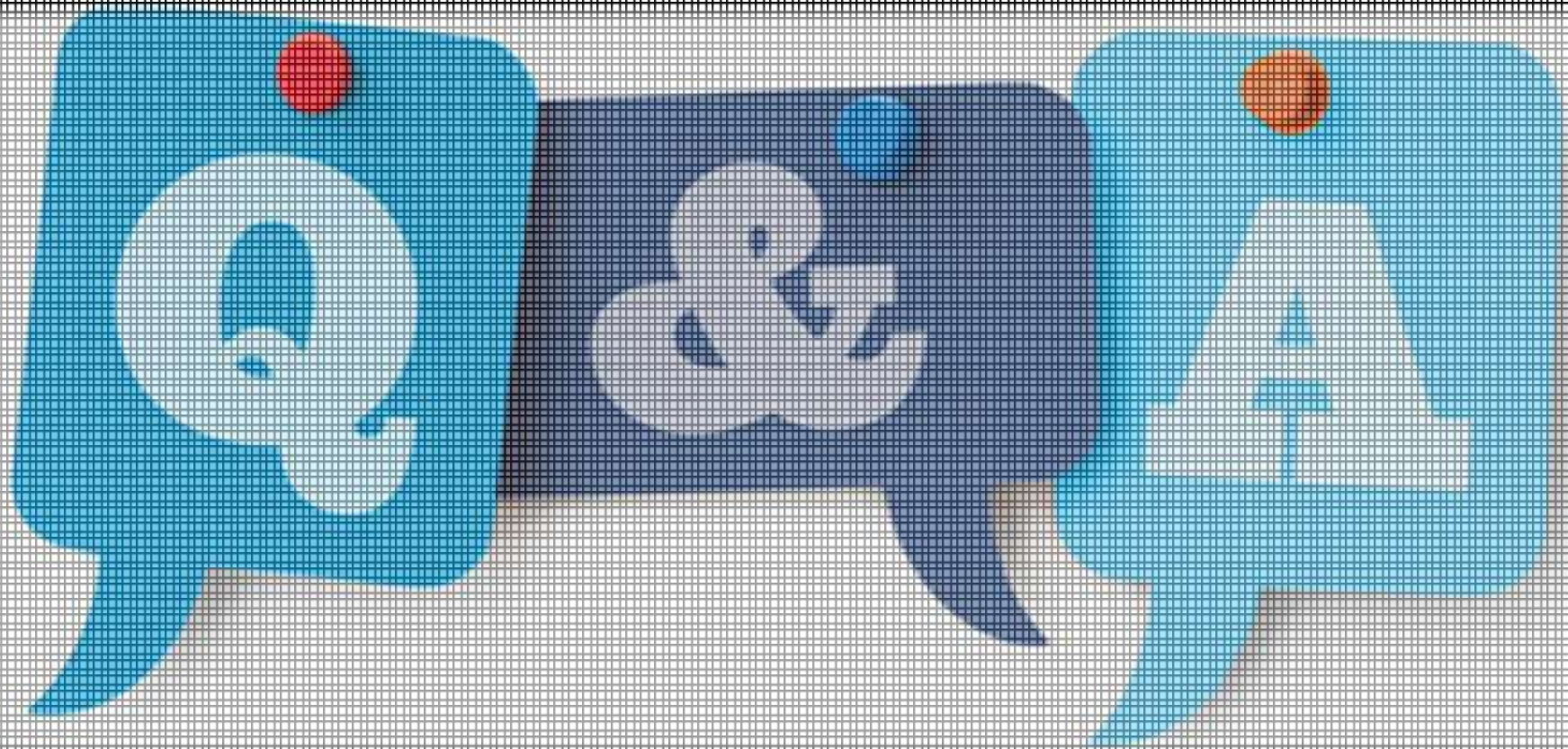
